LIBRARY

As always, 2014 once more showed the library to be a learning hub at Ashburton College with an array of initiatives aimed at assisting students in their learning, one of which is e-learning. We started the year with 32 students learning by e-learning, each student undertaking their coursework online. The e-learning experience was enhanced in 2014 by access to more computers and will be even better in 2015 with BYOD access.

In another initiative and one very much driven by senior students, we have had 38 Year 9 students being mentored by 16 Year 12 students under the Reading Mentors scheme.

The library also continued to be a foundation stone for the Year 10 Level 1 research assessment and the teaching of information literacy to Year 10 English students. 2014 saw a shift in emphasis from Google to alternate Search Engines and a variety of sources being the key to solid information literacy skills. eTV continues to prove itself as a valuable tool in this topic.

On an administrative level but one that will directly translate to learning, the library also acquired a new Library computer system, Access-it that will bring us into the web2 environment and thereby enable access to web-based resources, video and audio directly from our catalogue, as well as teacher resources and web2 tools.

Of course, nothing at the library can happen without the wonderful team that assembles each week to offer assistance and keep the library the vibrant place that it is. 16 student librarians offered their

services in 2014 and proved to be a reliable mainstay of our team. As well as the student librarians, we were also helped by 10 Year 13 Community Service volunteers, five adult volunteers, without whom we cannot function at the level we do.

Next year we have the exciting prospect of BYOD enhancing the library experience as more and more curriculum and NCEA standards require web-based tools.

Maatangi Whenua Competition – Regional and National Honours

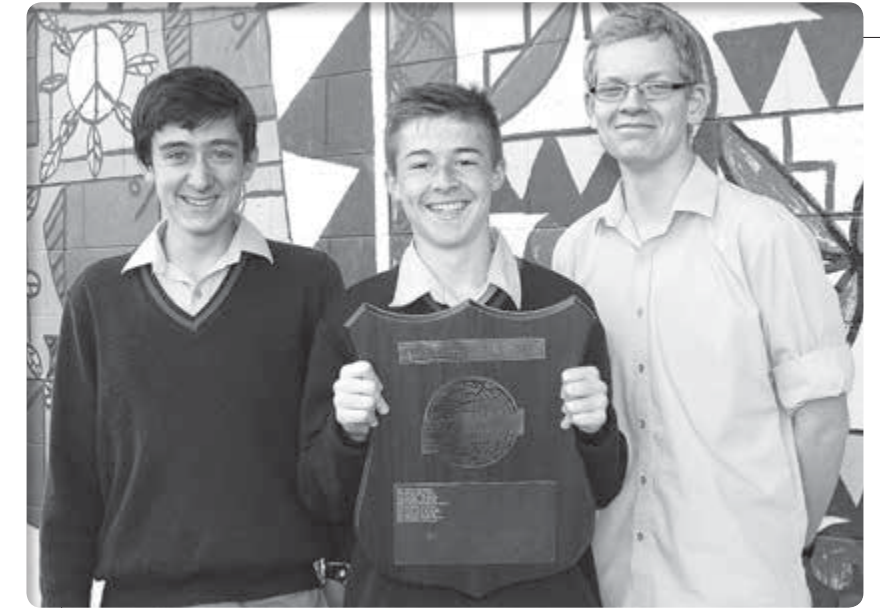

Mathematical Competitions 2014

In March the Otago University Junior Mathematics Competition was held. Over 10,000 New Zealand students entered the competition. It involved several long and difficult questions. Diana Barbu 9BC gained a "Top 100" award and Scott Kelland 11RV gained a "Top 200" award.

About 500,000 students from nearly 40 countries competed in the Australian Mathematics Competition in August. The format is mostly multi-choice, and the questions range from basic to very difficult. Tom Suh 9BC and Jessica Windhorst 9GF both gained Distinction. Six students gained Credit.

Also in August we had students enter the Australian Mathematics ICAS Competition. Tom Suh 9BC gained a High Distinction certificate (top 1%). Six students gained Credit and two students gained Merit.

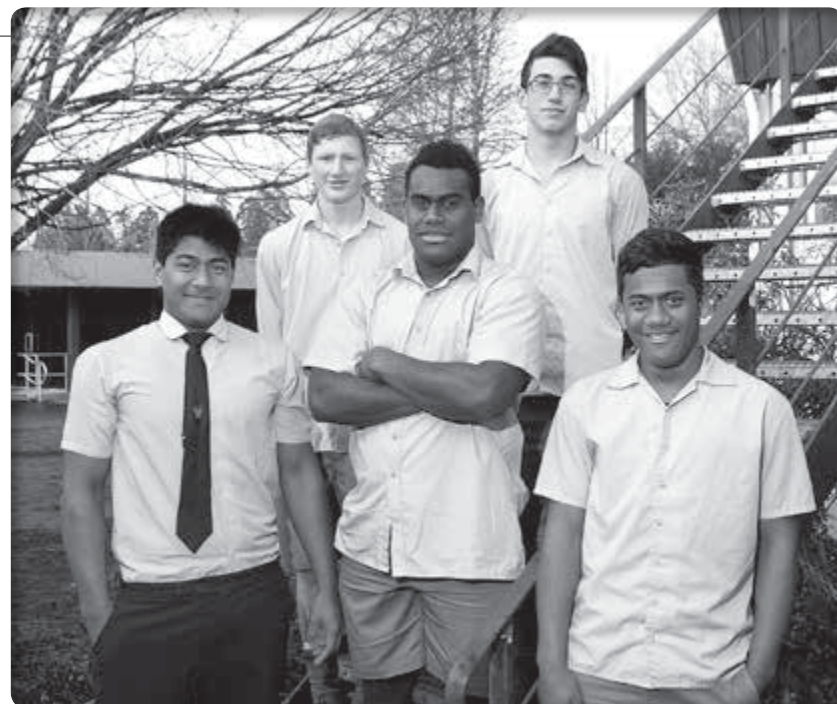

As part of the southern leg of the State New Zealand Ocean Swim Series Lucy Clough and Matthew Clough were again to the fore, on Sunday 23 February.

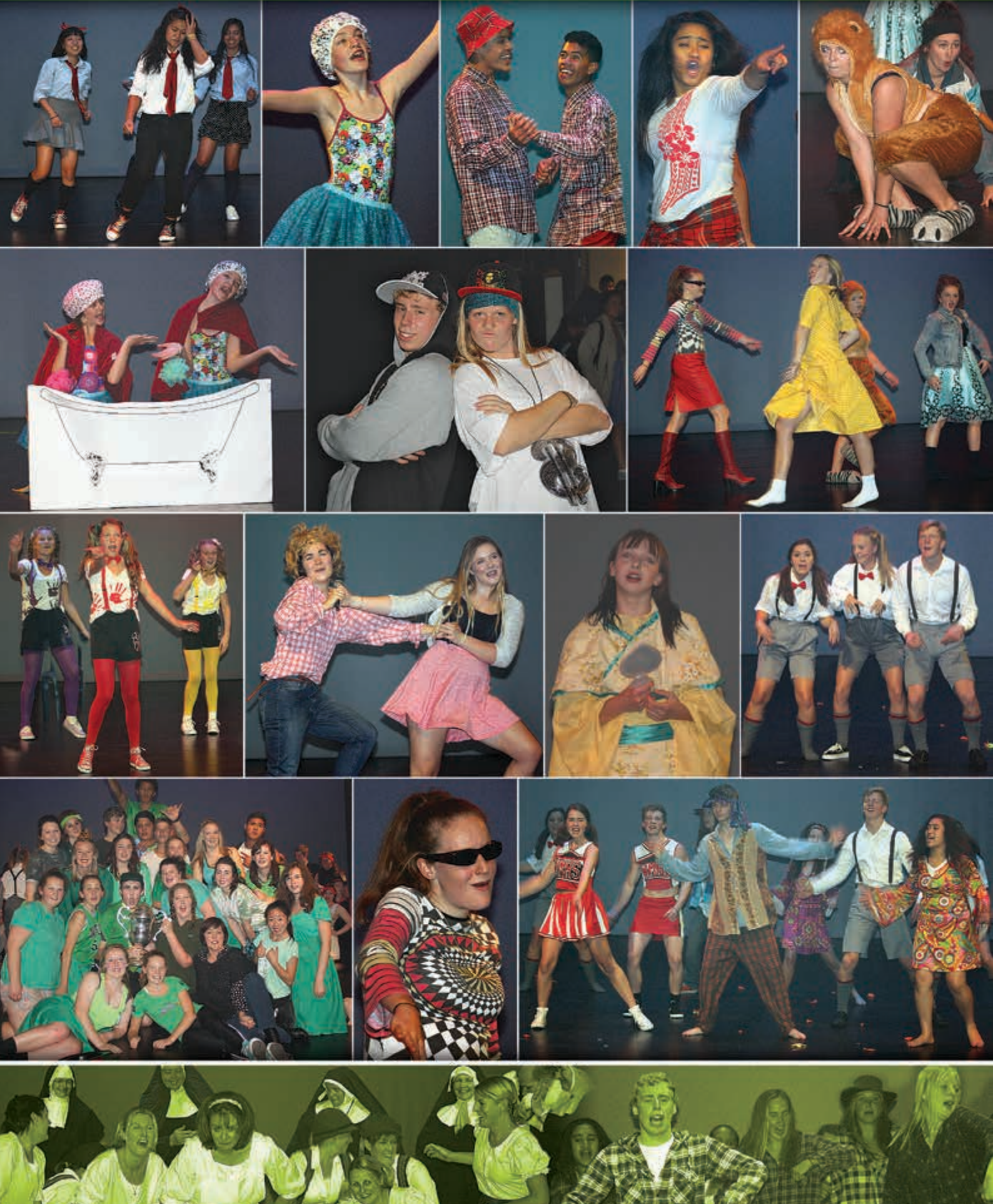

Third Grade

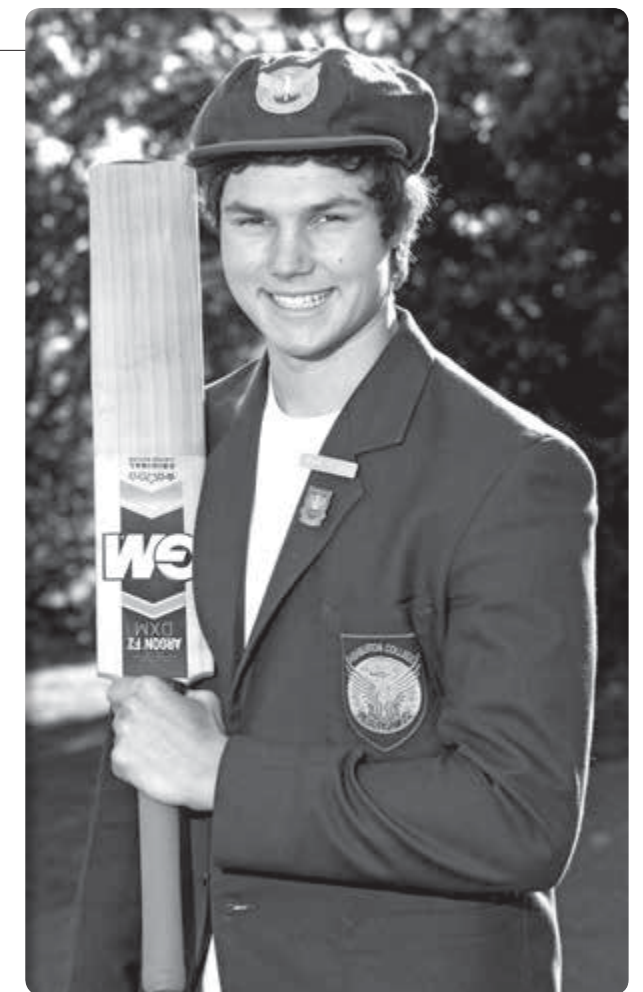

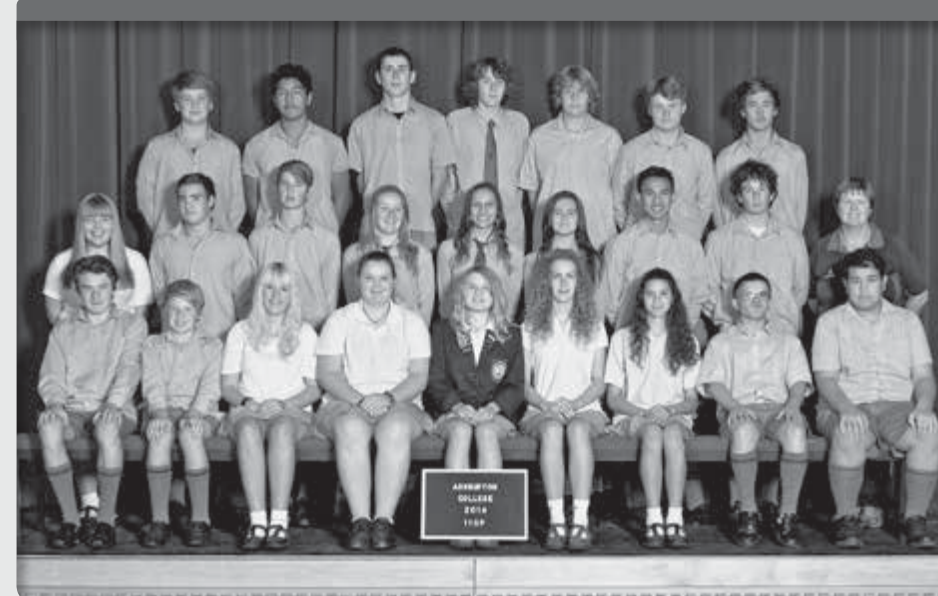
